A playlist of some of the live music venues that locals love and where a good time is guaranteed.

Check out what's on in Adelaide!



An eclectic artist-run venue featuring a hidden entrance, walls adorned with local artists' work and a broad range of live music - from experimental, to post-punk, to karaoke

18 Casablabla

Hosting regular salsa, reggae and Afro-Caribbean nights, this venue brings world cultures together at the heart of the Hindley Street music district.

19 Crown and Anchor Hotel

The 'Cranker' hosts live music nearly every night of the week. Built in 1883, in 2024 the venue was saved from demolition by its passionate community! From July 2025, the Cranker heads west, setting up a temporary home at The Ed Castle, serving community since 1837.

26 The Exeter Hotel

An East End institution featuring live bands and DJs every weekend. Extra credibility points if you spot and recreate the photo of Nick Cave, Kim Gordon and Tex Perkins in the front bar.

30 Grace Emily Hotel

Affectionately known as 'The Grace', this West-End pub hosts the city's longest running open mic night on Mondays - Billy Bob's BBQ Jam - plus jazz mid-week, new talent, and established bands.

33 Hindley Street Music Hall

The largest contemporary music venue in the city and the place to see big national and international touring artists. Their online accessibility guide has your good time in mind.

34 The Hotel Metropolitan

The Metro is a big supporter of live music, hosting gigs most nights of the week. It's also a pre-show dinner and drink favourite for performances at Her Majesty's Theatre next door.

37 Jive

Step inside past the Jimi Hendrix mural where you'll find a sunken dance floor, mezzanine level and lounge area. So, settle in and get your contemporary music fix from locals to touring acts.

39 The Lab at ILA An immersive performance space that encourages bands and DJs to experiment with ever-evolving tech and take their live performances and audiences in entirely new directions.

40 La Louisiane

A classy night out with French cuisine, live jazz, swing and cabaret music, and worldclass beverages that will transport you to the romantic boulevards of Paris.

43 Lion Arts Factory

This heritage-listed venue hosts touring artists, club nights and local shows. Keep an eye out for the yellow custard dripping down the side of the building, a clue to its former use.

52 Memphis Slim's House of Blues/ Shotgun Willie's

Inspired by the New Orleans and Chicago music scenes, get your basement blues jam on at Memphis Slim's or kick back with some country/folk music upstairs in Shotgun Willie's saloon.

57 Nexus Arts

This community-centred contemporary arts space champions culturally diverse and intercultural artistic practice hosting contemporary musicians from around the

61 North Adelaide **Baroque Hall**

Enjoy intimate chamber music concerts in this stunning rococo style music hall created in 2022 within a heritage listed North Adelaide home.

70 Rhino Room/Lowlife **Basement Bar**

See a gig upstairs at Rhino Room or have a late-night dance party at Lowlife. When these venues pair up, expect an intimate multistage festival with a mix of local and interstate bands.

72 Royal Oak

This classic North Adelaide pub hosts live music weekly with a focus on acoustic artists and cover bands you can dance to. Winged trumpets, trombones and a pressed tin ceiling are a vibe.

81 UniBar Adelaide

A vital part of university culture and the Australian live music scene since the 1970s, this venue hosts regular all ages shows and festivals from international bands to DJs to emerging local acts.

94 Marys Poppin

This proudly queer-owned and operated LGBTQIA+ venue won the 2024 SA Pride Awards Venue of the Year. Expect drag performances, themed nights, and late-night dancing.

98 Rocket Bar and **Rooftop**

Celebrating their 20th anniversary in 2025, this multi-level Hindley Street venue is the place for dance, hip-hop, and house music. Expect late-night rooftop dance parties and international DJ sets.

Sia Furler Lane

She Imagined Buttons, a mural by Jasmine Crisp, is inspired by her experience seeing nine-time Grammy nominee Sia

Cold Chisel Lane

Explore the legacy of Cold Chisel, formed in Adelaide in 1973, through the words of fans in a mural by James Dodd.

Paul Kelly Lane

Born and raised in Adelaide, national treasure Paul Kelly is celebrated through a light-based artwork Street of Love by Heidi Kenyon.

No Fixed Address Lane

Reggae rock band No Fixed Address were Australia's first Aboriginal band to tour overseas. See them commemorated in this mural by Elizabeth Yanyi Close (Pitjantjatjara and Yankunytjatjara), Shane Mankitya Cook (Guwa and Wulli Wulli) and Thomas Readett (Ngarrindjeri and Arrernte)

Paxton Walk

Fear by Gregg Mitchell, an artwork etched into the city's East End, captures the energy of Adelaide-based 1980s punk band Exploding White Mice.

City of Music Mural

Dave Court's artwork highlights the excellence, diversity and cultural history of this City of Music - plus, it's the biggest mural in the city!

The Violinist

Found on Rosina Street, this mural by artist Simeon Jones pays homage to the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra; their HQ is just around the corner on Hindley Street.

1866

Adelaide Town Hall

Adelaide's premier venue for concerts, civic receptions and public gatherings since 1866, even welcoming The Beatles in 1964! Free lunchtime performances often feature the famous J.W. Walker & Sons pipe organ. Classical, contemporary, or by candlelight - it's always memorable.



1870

Adelaide Central Market

A hub of food and culture, a feast for all the senses, with over 70 fresh produce traders and eateries. Its regular Friday night music program, school holiday activities and roving entertainment brings life and colour to our city all year round.



1900

Elder Hall

A renowned concert and performance venue on Adelaide's boulevard of culture and learning for students of the University of Adelaide's Elder Conservatorium of Music, the Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music (CASM), and guests. Free lunchtime concerts every Friday.



1913

Her Majesty's Theatre

'Her Maj' is a heritage jewel in the heart of the city, hosting national and international touring acts including contemporary and classical music, opera and ballet, and musical theatre.

1972

Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music (CASM)

The only tertiary level music program for First Nations musicians in Australia, CASM is a music hub where Aboriginal Australians can find their voice and realise their potential as musicians. Alumni include Electric Fields and No Fixed Address. 

1976


Rundle Mall

Adelaide New Year's Eve

31 December: City of Adelaide's New Year's Eve party on the banks of the River Torrens/Karrawirra Parri with family-friendly entertainment and fireworks shows.

Adelaide Festival

February-March: Since 1960, the Adelaide Festival has attracted global audiences and acclaim for its innovative arts, theatre, dance, music, opera, literature, and visual arts program.

Adelaide Fringe

February-March: The biggest arts festival in Australia and the second largest in the world, showcasing over 8,000+ performers across South Australia, with over 1 million tickets sold.

WOMADelaide

March: For over 30 years, Adelaide has hosted WOMAD in beautiful Botanic Park/Tainmuntilla. Travel the world through this four-day family-friendly music and arts festival.

Adelaide Jazz Festival

April: A multi-day, multi-venue program of traditional and contemporary live jazz leading up to UNESCO's International Jazz Day on 30 April. Adelaide is leading the UNESCO Jazz Relay in 2025, which is also the 10th anniversary of our UNESCO City of Music designation.

Record Store Day

12 April: Embrace vinyl culture with live performances, exclusive releases and a community spirit at our independent record shops. Support local!

DreamBIG Children's Festival

May (biennial): The longest-running curated children's festival in the world, and the only one in Australia, featuring children's music, dance and theatre experiences.

Adelaide Cabaret Festival and Make Music Day

June: The world's largest cabaret festival has showcased chanteuses and storytellers from across Australia and the world for 24 years in this glamorous winter event. There's also a Cabaret Fringe! On 21 June join us for Make Music Day, a worldwide celebration of music making across the City.

Illuminate Adelaide and Unsound Adelaide July: Catch experimental music festival, Unsound Adelaide,

during Illuminate Adelaide, a dazzling display of light, sound and technology transforming architecture, gardens and more. **Indie-Con, AIR Awards and Scouted**

August: A week of music celebrations including Australia's

leading independent music industry conference, an awards night for Australian musicians and a showcase of local talent.

Adelaide Guitar Festival September: The most significant celebration of the guitar in

the southern hemisphere, encompassing genres from country to classical to flamenco and featuring Guitars in Bars.

OzAsia Festival

October-November: A fusion of Eastern and Western sounds, celebrating contemporary Asian arts, music and culture. Enjoy live music and delicious food at the Lucky Dumpling Market.

Feast Festival

November: Adelaide's LGBTQIA+ queer arts and cultural festival glitters throughout the very special 'Pridevember', a celebration of diversity and inclusivity through arts, music and culture.

Good Music Month and SAM Awards



Christmas in the City

November-December: Since 1933, Father Christmas's arrival with the Adelaide Christmas Pageant has marked the start of our festive season, a joyful community tradition. Uplifting choirs can often be found at Adelaide Central Market, Adelaide Town Hall, Rundle Mall and Victoria Square/Tarntanyangga.
